Experience the National Park in a completely new way! Spectacular perspectives, largesize and unique snapshots let you dive into the wild world of the largest Swiss wilderness area. The Panorama provides an insight into the remotest areas of the Park and gives close-up views of the world of animals and plants in all seasons.

Protecting all natural processes is the highest aim of the National Park. In the Wilderness arena you will be able to experience immediately that nature is in unrestricted charge here. The stage made from Cembra wood lets you dive into a unique wilderness spectacle, surrounded by unfettered natural processes and supported by an authentic sound experience.

How does nature develop if man does not interfere? Since the foundation of the National Park in 1914 exact observation of changes in nature has always played an essential role. In the Open air laboratory you can personally be a researcher. At interactive stations you gain insights into selected research projects: On the world of animals and plants, on the Spöl river, climate change or the return of large predators.

Really wild is the leitmotiv of the National Park. But what does wilderness mean - and what does this have to do with me? Questions on our personal relationship to wilderness run through the entire exhibition like a common thread and lead to a surprising finale in the Perspectives room. Here we are made conscious of the fact that with our actions we have an influence on the development of nature and thus also of wilderness.
